## THE BLUE COAT SCHOOL CHRISTMAS QUIZ 2023

We received 118 entries for the quiz, eight more than last year and exactly the same as the year before. Of these only six were completely correct, compared with thirteen last time, so this was clearly a tough one. A further thirteen contestants made only one mistake and a total of 47 scored 95 or more.

As usual there were many familiar names on the leaderboard and the six who scored 100 are all regular contenders. After a draw, the prize winners are:

- 1. (£50) Christine BOND, Stretford
- 2. (£35) Rob IRVING, Cardross, Dunbartonshire
- 3. (£25) Chris Boyle, Diggle

Congratulations to all three and especially to Mrs Bond, who has successfully completed the quiz five times but has never won first prize. Mr Irving has also had five scores of 100 and Mr Boyle three.

Commiserations to the other three who scored 100: Ray HILL, Eccles, Richard SMITH, Lees (last year's winner), and John WEBB, Middleton. They and everyone else who scored 50 or more went into a draw for the £10 consolation prizes and the three winners are Jac BIRCH, Annalise SHORT and Sally TAYLOR. Those who scored 99 are also largely familiar names. They made errors on nine different questions, with Q95 eluding six of them.

Several alternative answers to those we expected were accepted. The main examples are listed below with state ZIP codes following the names of the cities, some very obscure.

- 3. As well as the expected APPLE CHARLOTTE (NC), other puddings said to have been named in honour of the wife of George III are LEMON and ROYAL CHARLOTTE.
- 5. We were certainly not expecting anyone but CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS (OH), but one regular contestant offered (probably in jest) his less famous brother and fellow explorer, BARTHOLOMEW.
- 36. The expected answer was ROBERT LOWELL (MA), but other New England poets include OLIVER (GA) HOLMES, WESLEY (IA) MCNAIR and LELAND (MS) KINSEY.
- 70. LIONEL HAMPTON (MA) was the only vibraphone player we had heard of, but MILTON (FL) JACKSON was a noted exponent of the same instrument. We also accepted ISAIAH (OK) PERKINS and DEXTER MANNING (SC), musicians who have written songs with "good vibes" in the title.

86. Both SAM TORRANCE (CA) and LEE WESTWOOD (KS) have been members of Ryder Cup winning teams and also won the Dunhill Links Championship.

Here are explanations for a few of the answers which proved most difficult to find:

- 35. ORLANDO (FL) BLOOM has played Legolas, an elf, in five films in the *Lord of the Rings* and *Hobbit* series. Several contestants offered Warwick Davis (CA), but he has played Lubdan, a leprechaun, in six films.
- 73. Most entrants knew or discovered that Ralph W Emerson and Henry D Thoreau were leading figures in the literary circle based in Concord (MA) in the mid-nineteenth century, but few found the precise answer to the clue. The CONCORD SONATA is a piano work by Charles Ives, with the first movement named after Emerson and the last after Thoreau.
- 95. This proved to be very difficult, with at least sixteen different answers submitted relating to American singers seen in various modes of transport. The answer is very precise, RENO (NE) SWEENEY being a nightclub singer travelling across the Atlantic aboard the liner SS American in the 1934 Cole Porter musical *Anything Goes*.
- 98. WE BOMBED IN NEW HAVEN (CT) is a 1967 anti-war black comedy by Joseph Heller which was surprisingly unsuccessful ("bombed").
- 99. The ABILENE (TX) PARADOX is a theory that is sometimes used to explain poor decision making by groups. It suggests that individuals who do not personally support a proposal will often vote in favour of it because they mistakenly believe that the majority of the group's members <u>do</u> support it; in other words they don't want to "rock the boat".

#### 100. WILL IT PLAY IN PEORIA?

Peoria (IL) has come to be regarded in popular culture as the archetypal small Middle American city, so this question is often jokily asked about a new product or political initiative.

After thirty years I have decided to retire from setting this quiz. I would like to thank everyone who has supported it, especially those who have been competing for all or most of that time.
